PASTOR'S NOTES

RCIA — what is that??

RCIA is an acronym which stands for the **R**ite of Christian Initiation of Adults. **RCIA** is meant to describe the process by which a person enters into the fullness of life in the Catholic Church.

First off, there are basically two (2) types of person who go through an **RCIA** program: <u>catechumens</u> or <u>candi-dates</u>. <u>Catechumens</u> are persons who are unbaptized, or belong to a non-Christian religion [e.g. - Hindu, Judaism, Islam, etc.]. <u>Candidates</u> are persons: (a) who are baptized Catholic but have never been catechized; (b) who are baptized Catholic and have celebrated the sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist, but have never been confirmed; (c) who are baptized but catechized in a non-Catholic religion [e.g. - Lutheran, Presbyterian, Baptist, etc.].

Entering into the life of the Church has always involved a process of some sort. In the earliest days of the Church the Gospel of Jesus' Death, Resurrection and Ascension into heaven was preached to nonbelievers. Those who came to believe in Jesus and desired to belong to the community of believers were enrolled in a three-year process called the **catechumenate**. In the catechumenate they were taught about the person of Christ, learned the various prayers of the Church and engaged in works of charity. At the end of the three-year catechumenate and at the Easter Vigil [Holy Saturday night] those adults were baptized, confirmed and received Eucharist for the first time. **At that time they became known as Christians.** As the centuries unfolded most of western Europe was Christian and the catechumenate fell into disuse.

In the early years of this country if a person desired to join the Catholic Church the local priest usually did some one-on-one instructions with the interested person with that person being confirmed by the bishop when he did his regular Confirmation tour of parishes in the diocese.

In the early 20th century a lot of historical research unearthed how the early church initiated people into Church life. With the Second Vatican Council [1962-1965] some of this historical material became **the basis of what we now call the RCIA process**. Presently the RCIA process acknowledges four (4) major time periods in the life of a person desiring to become a member of the Catholic Church:

- (1) the <u>first time period</u> involves a person beginning to ponder the possibility of joining the Church and asking questions about what is all involved in joining the Church;
- (2) in the <u>second time period</u> one is taught and learns the basic teachings of the Catholic faith. At St. Leo's/St. Thomas this period is known as the **lnquiry classes**, which are open to all people interested in learning more about the Catholic Church;
- (3) once the Inquiry classes are done and the person still desires to join the Church, the season of Lent is the <u>third</u> <u>period of time</u> when interested individuals more intensely witness to their desire and seek the prayers of the local church. During this time the persons are introduced to the local parish and are given presentations of the Faith along with prayers for their final days of journey into the Church.

This time period ends at the Easter Vigil [Holy Saturday night] when either <u>catechumens</u> are baptized, confirmed and receive Eucharist for the first time, or <u>candidates</u> desiring to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church are confirmed and receive Eucharist for the first time, or <u>candidates</u> having been baptized Catholic desire to complete their baptismal grace by being confirmed and thereby fully initiated members of the Catholic Church.

(4) the <u>fourth time period</u> follows a person's joining the Church and is known as mystagogy. At that time newly initiated members of the Church receive further instruction about church life and the practice of the Catholic faith.

This year St. Leo's parish has both a catechumen – **Hannah Schneider** {sponsor: Lillian Eberhardt} – and a candidate desiring to complete his baptismal grace by being confirmed and becoming fully initiated into the life of the Catholic Church – **Den Bolda** {sponsor: Brooks Kobiela}. **Please keep Hannah and Den in your prayers!!**
