

This week's Stewardship moment:

"...They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh." ~ Matthew 2:11

What gifts do you give the Lord? Pope St. Gregory said that these three gifts represent what we should give God every day. Gold – we should reflect Christ's wisdom in all our relationships. Frankincense – represents our daily prayer and adoration to God. Myrrh – is a symbol of our daily sacrifices that we unite with Jesus for the sake of others.

PASTOR'S NOTES

Epiphany - more than meets the eye

We are familiar with the story of magi following a star and bearing gifts of gold, myrrh and frankincense to the Christ Child. **This story has become the liturgy celebrated on Epiphany.** It is a beautiful, sentimental story imbedded within the Christmas scene. But there is more here than initially 'meets the eye'.

Epiphany is a theologically rich story paralleling great truths that will be more fully exposed in the public ministry of Jesus Christ.

First and foremost **the magi** in the Epiphany story represent the Gentile world (non-Jewish people) coming to worship a new born king of Israel. The Gentile world, unlike the Jewish nation, did not have the privilege of having had prophets announcing God's love affair with the human race. Yet here they come! **The point is** – All people throughout history, who seek the Truth and the meaning of life, will find it in the person of Christ born in Bethlehem. The Gospel of Jesus Christ is the story of salvation for the whole world that has come to be in Christ's Death and Resurrection. As John's Gospel tells us, "... anyone who accepts him, he empowered to become children of God." [Jn. 1:12]

In many ways **the star** of the Epiphany story confirms this:

Abraham, the father of the Jewish faith, had been promised descendants as numerous as the stars of the sky. Now this secondary light of a star leads the magi to the true light of the world through whom the whole world will be 'born again'.

In the Exodus story of God leading His people to freedom in the Promised land, a pagan prophet named Balaam was hired by a Moabite king to lay a curse on the Israelites. He was unable to do so; quite to the contrary, Balaam proclaimed a blessing saying, "I see him {God}, though not now; I behold him, though not near: a star shall advance from Jacob, and a staff shall rise from Israel," Is this the star of Bethlehem? The Israelites descend from Jacob and Israel with Jesus himself being an Israelite.

The star also foreshadows <u>all of creation responding</u> to one born in Bethlehem. Beyond the twinkling of the star, Jesus will walk upon the waters and calm its waves [Mt. 14:25ff; Mk. 6:48], at his death the sun will become darkened, the earth will quake, rocks will be split asunder [Lk. 23:44; Mk. 15:33] and sheol will surrender its dead [Mt. 27:52]. The one born in Bethlehem is Lord of heaven and earth. Thus, the Epiphany star is more than a celestial object or a stargazer's wonder. It symbolizes all creation pointing to and being subject to God's glory.

The **gifts of the magi** — **gold, frankincense and myrrh** also tell us who this Christ Child is — <u>gold</u> represents a king, <u>frankincense</u> speaks of worship given to God, and the scent of <u>myrrh</u> will cover the smell of death, which all human beings will experience, but will be conquered in Christ's death and resurrection.

As a side note — an Epiphany devotional practice is to have chalk blessed and then use the blessed chalk to inscribe upon the door frames of our homes the inscription — 20+C+M+B+25. As the Holy Family welcomed the wise men, may the doors of our homes this coming year be hospitable and welcoming. 2025 represents the present year; C-M-B traditionally represent the first letter of the names of the three wise men — Caspar, Melchior, Balthasar; the four crosses represent the four Gospels that tell the story of Christ, Savior of the World!

Such is the richness of the Epiphany story!
