A five-week hiatus into Eucharistic love —

For the next four weeks our Sunday Gospel readings will be taken from the sixth chapter of John's Gospel rather than the Gospel of Mark. The sixth chapter of John's Gospel is known as the **Bread of Life Discourse**. John 6 begins with Jesus feeding 5000 with five barley loaves and a couple of dried fish. This miracle feeding is followed by Christ declaring himself to be the Bread of Life. By the end of this sixth chapter some people reject this teaching while others accept.

In the life of the Church the <u>Bread of Life Discourse</u> (John 6) has been understood to be a discourse on the Real Presence of Christ's Body and Blood in the sacrament of the Eucharist. In that light I thought I would offer a weekly reflection on the Eucharist during our four-week journey through the sixth chapter of John's Gospel and Christ's Discourse of the Bread of Life. [On the fourth week (Sunday, August 15th) we celebrate the Holy Day of Mary's Assumption into heaven. Therefore, that week's reflection will be on the Blessed Virgin Mary].

An opening thought – over my 43 years as a priest a lot of printer's ink has been spilled over the topic of the Eucharist – lower Mass attendance; whether President Biden should be denied Communion; celebrating Confirmation before Eucharist; retranslating the words and prayers of the Mass; proper way to receive Communion; receiving Communion while living in the state of mortal sin; lack of reverence at Mass; etc. The list could go on and on!

It has often been heard and said that *Mass is boring!!* Is Mass boring? Of all the 7 sacraments Christ left the Church to guide us on our spiritual journey to heaven only the Eucharist is called "The Blessed Sacrament". **How can it be that something called 'Blessed' could be boring?** Perhaps from another angle – the last Church Council (Vatican II -1962-65) taught us that the Eucharist is the 'source and summit' of Christian life and living. **How is something that should be the pinnacle of one's spiritual life be sought by fewer and fewer people?**

On a couple of occasions Christ said some remarkable things about humanity: (1) He found himself unable to work miracles in his hometown because "he was amazed their lack of faith." [Mk 6:6]; (2) As Christ approaches the city of Jerusalem he speaks about a number of themes in life {corruption in the world of justice; lack of gratitude on the part of 9 healed lepers; indifference to the poor on our door steps} and then muses — "when the Son of Man comes will he find any faith on the earth?"

More than a critique of humanity Christ is challenging us to more deeply probe the many lessons and mysteries he left us to unwrap and engage. Certainly the glorious gift of the Eucharist (going to Mass) is a mystery of faith. As St. Paul says, "Faith comes through hearing." [Rom 10:17]

Over the course of the next few weeks I plan on preaching and writing about this mighty gift of the Lord – *The Eucharist of His Body and Blood.* The more one knows, the more insight one possibly has in probing this mystery that goes by many names in the Catechism – the Lord's Supper; the Breaking of the Bread; Holy Sacrifice; Holy and Divine Liturgy; Holy Communion; the Mass;. As the old saying goes – To know, know you is to love, love you. To fall in love with the Eucharist would be ecstasy!!
