PASTOR'S NOTES

Lenten Holy Hour — this Friday evening

On this Friday, March 10th beginning at 5 p.m. St. Leo's will host an hour of Eucharistic exposition and adoration. During that 'hour with the Lord' we will pray that day's Evening Prayer of the Church and a Rosary. The 'holy hour' will close with Benediction. People can then go to our Lenten soup & sandwich supper at 6 p.m. followed by our Lenten Stations of the Cross at 6:30 p.m.

40 in the '40 days of Lent'

If you count the actual number of days from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday you will end up with 47 days. So how do we end up with '40 days of Lent'?

As with many things there are numerous historical events and turning points that have brought us to where we are today and the same is true about our commonly understood notion of '40 days of Lent' that comprise the season of Lent.

In the earliest days of the Church -- <u>Good Friday</u> celebrated Christ's death, with <u>Holy Saturday</u> celebrating Christ's time in the tomb, and <u>Easter Sunday</u> culminating in Christ's resurrection from the dead. These days were known as the Paschal Triduum. Shortly thereafter, <u>Thursday</u> which celebrates Christ's Last Supper, was incorporated into the days of the Paschal Triduum. But soon this whole week came to be directed towards the paschal festivities of Christ's life-giving death and resurrection. **This has come to be known as Holy Week** with the Triduum being <u>Holy Thursday</u>, <u>Good Friday</u> and <u>the Easter Vigil</u> [Holy Saturday evening.] Holy Week is meant to be a final, intense and focused meditation on the events that led up to **That Event**, which changed time and history.

On a second big historical note, the sense of the faithful was that, since the glory of Easter was celebrated over the course of 50 days [the Easter season], there should be a similar length of time in <u>penitential preparation</u> for what Christ did in his agonizing passion and death in saving the human race. This is where the number 40 comes into play.

In Scripture 40 is a highly symbolic number. Forty represents a critical amount of time during which serious transformations of life happen. For example—it rained for 40 days and 40 nights during the time of Noah and the great flood; God forms the people of Israel during 40 years in the desert of the Exodus journey; Moses spends 40 days on Mt. Sinai when receiving the Ten Commandments; King David, to whom God makes a promise of a messiah, reigns as king for 40 years; Elijah walks 40 days to Mt. Horeb to receive the call to be Israel's first prophet; Christ fasted for 40 days in the desert before beginning his public ministry; after the Resurrection Christ appears for 40 days upon the earth before ascending to heaven.

<u>In addition</u> to the more intense focus of Holy Week and the fact that Christ spent **40** days in the desert, **40** seems an appropriate amount of penitential preparation to make up the season of Lent. Together '40 days of Lent and Holy Week seems a good balance to the 50 festive days celebrating Easter glory. In order to get '40 days of Lent', Lent has to begin on Ash Wednesday and go to Palm/Passion Sunday when the special focused preparatory time of Holy Week begins. And so it is we arrive at '40 days of Lent'.

May our '40 days of Lent' and Holy Week awaken us to the mystery of God's love-suffering for the human race and the promise of resurrected life for all who give themselves to Christ.
