COVID 19 — Does Lent have anything to say?

As we live in these times of the coronavirus, does the world of faith, church or religion have anything to say or is this simply a disease and medical problem of great proportions?

As I was reflecting on this question, it came to mind that Lent began on Ash Wednesday with a reading from the prophet Joel. In Joel's time a great pestilence of locust was threatening the existence of the people of Israel. Joel's response was to summon an assembly of people to pray that God would raise his protective hand and stave off this imminent disaster. This story has some eerie semblance to our times with people having died, are dying, many infected, and daily life totally disrupted. It certainly seems prayer needs to be one of our responses along with heeding the best of medical advice.

On a theological level COVID 19 is an evil. Like all evil the Catechism of the Catholic Church reminds us that it "cannot be understood apart from (its) connection to Adam's sin ..." [403]. God created all things with "its own goodness and proper perfection, but it did not spring forth complete from the hand of the Creator" [302]. The best of what God created (angels and mankind) were created in God's image and likeness and endowed with the power of the intellect to know the truth and the power of the will to choose the good. "Angels and men, as intelligent and free creatures, have to journey toward their ultimate destinies by their free choice and preferential love. They can therefore go astray." [311]

When Adam/Eve freely chose to disobey God, **moral evil entered the human condition** and has universally affected the world to this day. Adam/Eve's tempter continues unabated to this day. His hatred for God and God's moral authority (represented by the tree of knowledge of good and evil in the garden of Eden) is to seduce people to 'be like God" but "without God, before God, and not in accordance with God" [398]. This is the mark of all sin – venial or mortal! Perhaps this behavior is seen in recent wild beach parties all the while disregarding the call for small groups and social distancing.

The more we 'poo-hoo' sin as belonging to some unenlightened age, the more its effects gets imbedded into structures of living and becomes what the Catechism of the Catholic Church calls "structures of sin", which "are the expression and effect of personal sins. They lead their victims to do evil in their turn" [1869].

Where is God in all of this? In deepest respect for his order of creation (i.e., free choice and preferential love) by making us in his image and likeness (intellect and will) "God is in no way, directly or indirectly, the cause of moral evil. He permits it ... and, mysteriously, knows how to derive good from it" [311]. This is most deeply seen in the greatest moral evil - *the murder of his Son*. It brought the greatest of goods – *the redemption of the human race*.

COVID 19 is as much a religious issue as it is a medical crisis and human tragedy. What sinful choices and decisions gave rise to COVID 19 stand at the heart of this crisis. It could be a history of such choices and decisions (structures of sin) that simply came to a head in our times.

Lent is a time for prayer, almsgiving and fasting. Like the prophet Joel we need to gather and raise our voices in **prayer** that God's grace would lead us in a spirit of **almsgiving** to beat back the structures of sin that make us feel OK about being petty, polarized, arrogant and self-righteous. Those structures can be conquered when we seriously **fast** by examining our consciences and coming to grip with our disobedience to God's commandments, our search for cheap grace, our meager attempts at spiritual living, our half-hearted love of God and neighbor, our busyness with all the wrong things, our lack of adult faith, our failure to morally 'connect the dots', etc.

Sounds like a time for a good confession!
