PASTOR'S NOTES

Christmas - what's at stake?

The Christmas story actually begins at the time of the Fall of Adam and Eve, our first parents. They fell from God's grace by deliberately disobeying God's command not to eat from the tree of knowledge of good and evil. As punishment they were expelled from the Garden of Eden and hence began humanity's long journey into the darkness of the human condition, which is the exact opposite of life in Paradise.

God's love of human creation could not be contained. He made many covenants [Noah, Abraham, Moses at Sinai, David] and sent many prophets [e.g. -Isaiah, Jeremiah, Ezekiel] to pull his people back from the precipice of disaster. Christmas is the beginning of God's final attempt to save humanity. In their own words this is how St. Leo, Diognetus, St. Augustine, and St. Bernard of Clairvaux describe what is at stake in the Christmas story:

- Pope St. Leo the Great {died 461} writes For <u>unless</u> the new man (Jesus), by being made in the likeness of sinful humanity, had taken on himself the nature of our first parents, <u>unless</u> he had stooped to be one in substance with his mother while sharing the Father's substance and, being alone free from sin, united our nature to his, the whole human race would still be held captive under the dominion of Satan. The Conqueror's victory would have profited us nothing if the battle had been fought outside our human condition.
- **Diognetus** {second century writer} writes When we had made it clear that we could never enter God's Kingdom by our own power, we were to be enabled to do so by the power of God. When our wickedness had reached its culmination ... (God) did not show hatred for us or reject us or take vengeance; instead he was patient with us, bore with us, and in compassion took our sins upon himself; he gave his own Son as the price of our redemption, the holy one to redeem the wicked, the sinless one to redeem sinners, the just one to redeem the unjust, the incorruptible one to redeem the corruptible, the immortal one to redeem mortals. For what else could have covered our sins but his sinlessness? Where else could we wicked and sinful as we were have found the means of holiness except in the Son of God alone?
- St. Augustine {354-430} writes You would have suffered eternal death, had he not been born in time. Never would you have been freed from sinful flesh, had he not taken on the likeness of sinful flesh. You would have suffered everlasting unhappiness, had it not been for this mercy. You would never have returned to life, had he not shared your death. You would have been lost if he had not hastened to your aid. You would have perished, had he not come.

The Christmas story is an intersection of many lives cooperating with God great plan of his Son's incarnation and him taking on human nature all the while retaining his divine nature. There is the part played by <u>Joseph</u>, the birth and role of <u>John the Baptist</u> and of course the 'yes' of <u>Mary</u>. St. Bernard of Clairvaux reflects on the angel Gabriel's visit to Mary (Annunciation) —

St. Bernard of Clairvaux {1090-1153} writes — The angel awaits an answer; ... We too are waiting, O Lady ... the price of our salvation is offered to you. We shall be set free at once if you consent ... Tearful Adam with his sorrowing family begs this of you, O loving Virgin ... Abraham begs it, David begs it. All the other holy patriarchs, your ancestors, ask it of you as they dwell in the country of the shadow of death. This is what the whole earth waits for ... for on your word depends comfort for the wretched, ransom for the captive, freedom for the condemned, indeed, salvation for all the sons of Adam, the whole of your race. Answer quickly, O Virgin. ... See, the desired of all nations is at your door, knocking to enter. she says, "be it done to me according to your word".

So Christmas came to be!
