This week's Stewardship moment:

In gratitude for all that we have been given, we are called to generously share all our gifts, not just the ones we pick and choose. God wants us to be generous with everything, but especially that one thing that means the most to you.

PASTOR'S NOTES

Epiphany – some spiritual musings

This year the Christmas season goes from December 26th through January 11th. This is a total of 18 days and within these 18 days the Church celebrates three solemnities [**Christmas day** {December 25th}; **Mary, Mother of God** {January 1st}; and **Epiphany** {this Sunday, January 4th}. In addition there are **five feast days**:

St. Stephen {December 26th}; St. John the Apostle {December 27th}; The Holy Innocents {December 28th}; Holy Family Sunday and Baptism of the Lord {January 11th}. Almost half of the Christmas season is taken up by these special feast days. In turn, each of these 8 days carry deep spiritual truths worthy of reflections to deepen our spiritual lives and what it means to be a Christmas people.

Today I would like to offer some reflections on today's solemnity – **Epiphany**:

Epiphany is a spiritual story about some wise men who make their way to Bethlehem and honor a new born child with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. This is the story's most basic outline. It is all the details within the story that offer points of much reflection —

(1) We are told these men come from the east and have been following a star that has attracted their attention. We might assume they are astrologers who believe the stars of the sky carry messages and tell stories. This particular star has told them about a new-born king of the Jews.

~ **a point of spiritual reflection** – *the world of creation contains a number of 'etchings' by God whose wisdom created all things. If we deeply ponder and probe this creation wisdom ['etchings'], we begin to see God's plan for creation. This is what is called natural law. Natural law is foundational to many of the Church's moral and spiritual teachings. The original sin took this natural order and used it in ways unintended by God, Creator and Designer of the universe. But when used, like the magi, it can lead us to God!!*

(2) Initially the star led the magi to Jerusalem where they queried about the new-born king. The people of Jerusalem opened the book (the Bible) and found the passage from Micah that speaks about a ruler coming from Bethlehem who will shepherd God's people [Micah 5:1].

~ **a point of spiritual reflection** – *this is a very sad point – the pagan magi go to Bethlehem, but the 'believers' are unmoved. Why not go? Bethlehem is only about 7 miles from Jerusalem. Do they not believe in the gift of natural law? Are they prejudiced against 'strangers from the east'? Does this fulfill John 1:11 "... to his own he came, yet his own did not accept him." or more harshly John 3:19 "... the light came into the world, but men loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were wicked."*

(3) The magi arrive in Bethlehem, prostrate themselves, honor the child and offer gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

~ **a point of spiritual reflection** – *gold suggests something for a person of royal or kingly status; frankincense is the stuff of worship and used around altars; myrrh is used to cover the smell of death. Do these three gifts together suggest the sacrificial death of Calvary {myrrh} of the second person of the Godhead {gold} who is now found upon the altars of our churches {frankincense}?*

(4) The three gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh suggest there were 3 wise men. Scripture itself does not make this point.

~ **a point of spiritual reflection** – *the magi represent the Gentile world (non-Jewish people) coming to worship the Savior of the world. God's great plan of redeeming the human race is now set in motion. The prophet Isaiah's Advent vision of people streaming to Mount Zion to be instructed in God's way [Is. 2:1-5] is beginning to unfold.*
